What's THE OVERNIGHT all about?

PBIS- Positive Behavioral Intervention Support

A comprehensive approach to orienting the incoming class to not only getting to know each other, the older leaders of the school (LEOS), the 9th grade team of teacher, the administration, and “The Howard Way.”

-Structured Workshops-conflict resolution, confidence course, using your resources, discipline ladder / PBIS, civility, scavengers hunt related to 9th grade mission statement, school pride involvement, and small group discussions. Bonding-fire pits, talk about fears, expectations, any questions that want to ask.

Who are the LEOS?

Leos are a selected group of school peer leaders who best demonstrate “The Howard Way” on a consistent basis.

FUNCTIONS OF THE 9TH GRADE TEAM

- Meet for ½ hour on B-days
- Discuss strategies to help students improve. Behavioral or academically.
- Provide intervention.
- ¼ and monthly awards.
- Maintain consistency.

What is school-wide PBIS?

Schools that implement school-wide systems of positive behavior support focus on taking a team-based system approach and teaching appropriate behavior to all students in the school.

1. Behavioral Expectations are Defined.

-POSITIVE, CLEAR, AND SIMPLE RULES

2. Behavioral Expectations are Taught.

-SOCIAL CONTRACTS




3. Appropriate Behaviors are Acknowledged.

-PAWS, MONTHLY DRAWINGS, ¼ REWARDS

4. Behavioral Errors are Corrected Proactively.

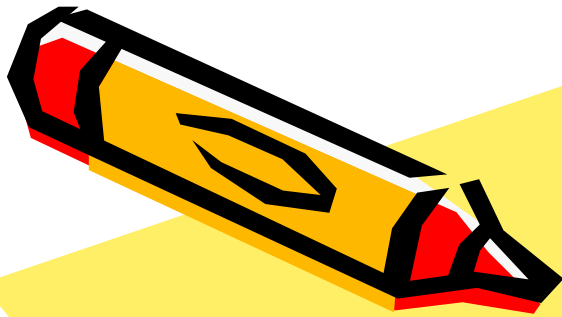
WHAT IS A PAW, AND WHAT DO STUDENTS DO WITH THEM?

- A PAW is awarded to a student who demonstrates, “The Howard Way.”
- If your student receives a PAW from a teacher they are then eligible for a prize from the grade level PBIS monthly drawing. Prizes include anything from free sports passes, movie tickets, etc.

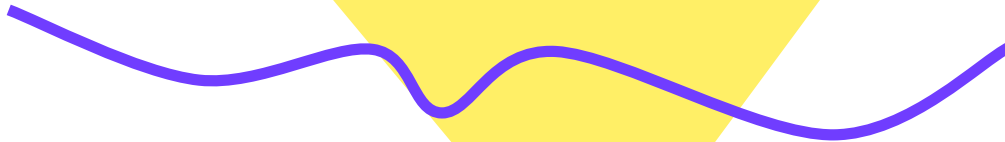

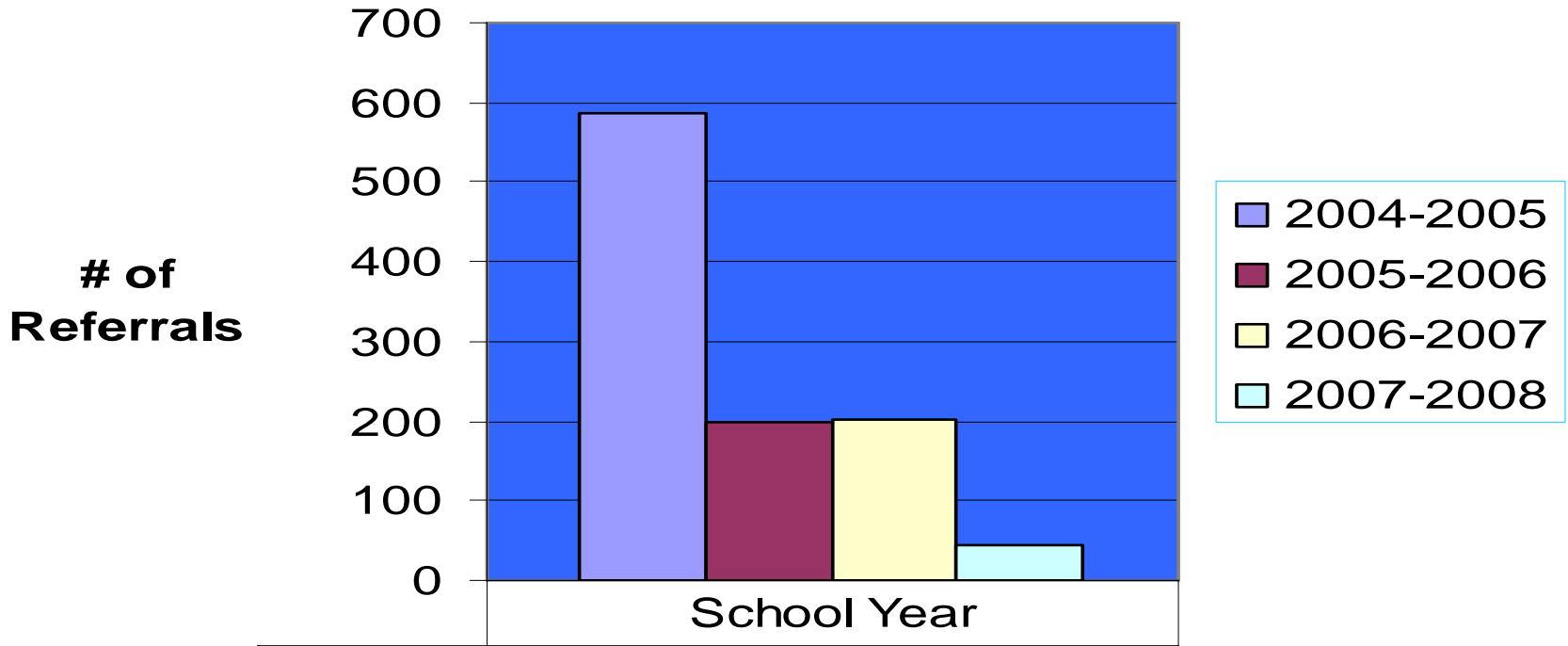

**Keys To Success
for 9th Grade
Students and
Parents**

Organization/Preparation

- Get appropriate amount of sleep (8-10 hours) and proper nutrition.
- Be prepared with notebooks, binders, and other required items (indicated by teachers)
- Use agenda books consistently to write down homework and other reminders
- Share agenda books with parent/guardian at home

Communication

- Read and discuss classroom/school policies together.
- Communicate your concerns with the appropriate person.
- Ask about resources/services that can provide academic support.

Accountability

- 9th grade students must be held accountable!
- Check agenda books nightly for assigned homework.
- Check grade sheets regularly- all 9th grade students are responsible for keeping an up-to-date grade log for each class
- Encourage students to attend study skills seminars and after school tutoring when needed.

Legal Absences

- Death in the immediate family
- Illness
- Court summons
- Work if approved by Principal
- Observance of religious holidays

Attendance

- Unlawfully missing 5% (9 absences) of a course will result in a possible denial of credit for that course.
- Being more than 20 minutes late to a class will result in an absence for that class.
- Being more than 90 minutes late to school will result in 1/2 day absence.

Electronic Policies



- Double O policy (off and out of sight)
- Between 7:20 – 2:10 no electronic devices
- Consequences will be assigned as follows:
 - 1st detention : device returned at the end of day
 - 2nd Friday/Saturday school. Parent retrieve device
 - 3rd In school suspension. Parent retrieve device
 - 4th In school suspension. Device retrieved at the end of the academic quarter.
 - 5th Consequence assigned by administrator. Device retrieved at the end of the academic quarter



Alcohol Use Among Adolescents

- 5,000 young people under the age of 21 die as a result of underage drinking.
- More than two-thirds of 10th graders, and about two in every five 8th graders have consumed alcohol.
- Students who begin drinking before the age of 15 are four times more likely to become dependant on alcohol.
- Nearly 1 million high school students nationwide are binge drinkers.

Alcohol at School

- When a student has possession of alcohol or consumed before entering school property (can include any HCPSS property), they will be suspended from school and can be given citation from police.
- Could be removed from sports team or clubs.
- If you suspect that students are drinking feel free to call student services at 410-313-2871.
- SRO (School Recourse Officer): Corp. Mike Williams: feel free to contact with questions and concerns.

Safe School Environment

- **Bullying-Safe Schools Reporting Act** of 2005 states that bullying is conduct that creates a hostile educational environment by substantially interfering with a students' educational benefits, opportunities, or performance, or with a student's physical or psychological well-being and is motivated by an actual or perceived personal characteristic.
- **Cyber-bullying**-Using the internet, cell phones and other technological devices to harass, humiliate, intimidate or threaten others.
- **Harassment**-A sufficiently severe action or persistent, pervasive pattern of actions or statements directed at an identifiable individual or group, that is intended to be ridiculing or demeaning.
- Discussions of illegal substances or contraband could lead to conversations and searches by administrators.
